Tri-Town Meeting Day to Change in 2019

Beginning with the January 2019 meeting, our meeting night will change from the 3rd Friday to the 4th Friday of the month. This is being done to avoid meeting night conflicts with another ham club in the area. Hopefully this will increase attendance at Tri-Town meetings and allow for better programs.

FCC Accepting Applications for Engineering Honors Program

The FCC is accepting applications from graduate engineers for its 1-year career development Engineering Honors Program, launched this past spring. The deadline to apply is November 30, 2018. The program is open to recent engineering school graduates and current students who will graduate this academic year. Current students who will graduate in December will be considered and are encouraged to apply. At the end of the 1-year program, Honors Program engineers will be eligible for consideration for continued employment at the FCC.

The FCC said it is looking for new engineering talent “to work on cutting-edge issues in the communications and high-tech arenas.” These include enabling the introduction of new technologies and services such as 5G, the Internet of Things, next-generation TV broadcasting, broadband satellite systems, and broadband deployment.

“Selection for the Honors Engineer Program is highly competitive, and the FCC will review many facets of a candidate’s background, including academic achievement, technical skills, engineering and extracurricular activities, and demonstrated interest in government service and/or the communications sector,” the FCC said in announcing the application window. Interested candidates should review the recruitment announcement and apply online.

India Gains 3 New Bands, Sweden Gets 60-Meter Access

Radio amateurs in India now have access to three new bands. India’s Ministry of Communications’ Department of Telecommunications has published an updated National Frequency Allocation Plan, effective October 25, which lists the new bands at 5 MHz (60 meters), 472 kHz (630 meters), and 136 kHz (2300 meters). All allocations are on a secondary basis.

On 60 meters, hams now have access to 5,351.5 – 5,366.5 kHz at 15 W EIRP; on 630 meters, 472 – 479 kHz at 1 W EIRP, and on 2300 meters, 135.7 – 137.8 kHz at 1 W EIRP.

Sweden’s IARU member-society SSA reports that radio amateurs there gained routine secondary access to 5,351.5 – 5,366.5 kHz at 15 W EIRP on November 1. Temporary permission has been available since 2016, by application. SSA recommends following IARU Region 1 guidelines for using the band; a Swedish version is available. — *Thanks to Paul Gaskell, G4MWO, Editor, The 5 MHz Newsletter; SSA*

Palm Radio Going out of Business

Key and paddle maker Palm Radio is going out of business, Dieter Engels, DJ6TE, announced on the company’s website. “For health reasons and after the passing of Brunhilde, DK7SN; Uli, DL2BAT, and Klaus, DL9SKE, I am not able to continue Palm Radio in its current form,” Engels wrote. “I will only deliver remaining stock,” and he invited inquiries via email.

Marshall Emm, N1FN, of Morse Express — a carrier of Palm Radio products — said that Engels “has been unwell for some time,” but added that Morse Express would continue to service them for as long as it can. Palm Radio products have been popular among portable operators.

Special Call Signs for Centenary of World War I Armistice

Several countries around the world have authorized the use of special call signs or prefixes to mark the centenary of the armistice that marked the end of hostilities on the Western Front of World War I. The initial armistice took effect on November 11, 1918, at 11 AM (the Treaty of Versailles that officially ended World War I was not signed until the following year). Formerly known as Armistice Day in the US and in other countries, November 11 later became recognized as Veterans Day in the US, and as Remembrance Day in others, as a day to honor veterans of the armed services from all wars and conflicts.

In the UK, special event station GB100ARM will be on the air until November 28, operated by the HMS *Belfast* Radio Group. Operation will take place from the bridge wireless office aboard HMS *Belfast*.

In Belgium, radio amateurs may use the OP prefix instead of ON during November as part of the 100th anniversary. The “P” stands for “poppies.” The association between poppies and Armistice Day (and, later, Veterans Day and Remembrance Day) was inspired by the World War I poem “In Flanders Fields” by John McCrae, which refers to poppies as the first flowers to grow in the earth above soldiers’ graves in the Flanders region of Belgium. Veterans groups in some countries hand out paper poppies in conjunction with Veterans Day/Remembrance Day observances.

Additional stations include France’s TM5PAX, which is active on all bands and modes through November 11, and South Africa’s ZS100WWI, which is on the air for the entire month of November.

WX Forecast Forces Shutdown of VP6D Ducie Is. DXpedition

The VP6D Ducie Island DXpedition announced just after 1600 UTC on October 31 that, “due to an expected worsening in landing conditions,” it would cease operations. VP6D now is off the air. The final contact count was 121,136. Most contacts — 67,686 — were on CW, with 28,736 on SSB and 24,714 on digital modes. The plan had been to continue operating until November 1 at 1500 UTC.

“It’s been raining all night, with 20+ knot winds,” a news bulletin from the team said. “The ship is about 300 meters off shore, the forecast indicates continuing 20+ knot winds, 2 – 3 meter seas.”

“We are collecting all the logs and will send to the EU QSL management team (hopefully before we leave); they will remove FT8 dupes and refresh the server before turning on OQRS.”

According to DXA, KB7QFE appears to have scored the final contact with VP6D.

Earlier this week, the team announced plans to tear down the CW and SSB camps on November 1, with antennas, and all non-essential equipment removed from the island to the M/V *Braveheart*. The next day, sleeping tents were to come down and all remaining gear will be transported to the ship, which was expected to depart Ducie Island at about 2300 UTC, getting under way at 0200 UTC on November 3 after all gear has been stowed. The schedule was arranged so that the team would not miss the once-per-week flight from Mangareva, French Polynesia, to Tahiti. It’s likely that this schedule will be accelerated. “We want to thank everyone for their support and hope we met your expectations,” the team’s latest update said.

FCC Fines HAM \$25,000 for Operating Unlicensed FM Station

In an FCC Enforcement Bureau case going back to early 2015, a Paterson, New Jersey, Amateur Radio licensee has been penalized in the amount of \$25,000 for allegedly continuing to operate an unlicensed FM radio station. The FCC issued a *Forfeiture Order* on October 30 to Winston A. Tulloch, KC2ALN, a General class licensee. The fine followed an April 2018 *Notice of Apparent Liability for Forfeiture (NAL)* issued to Tulloch for alleged “willful and repeated violation” of Section 301 of the Communications Act of 1934, as amended, by operating an unlicensed FM radio station on 90.9 MHz in Paterson. Tulloch did not respond to the *NAL*, the FCC indicated.

“Commission action in this area is essential because unlicensed radio stations do not broadcast Emergency Alert Service messages and therefore create a public safety hazard for their listener,” the FCC said in the *Forfeiture Order*. “Moreover, unlicensed radio stations create a danger of interference to licensed communications and undermine the Commission’s authority over broadcast radio operations.”

Following up on February 2015 complaints regarding pirate radio operations in Paterson, FCC agents spotted a signal on 90.9 MHz that “appeared to be an unauthorized radio station.” Agents determined the signal was emanating from a multi-family dwelling and noticed an FM antenna on the structure. The measured field strength exceeded the limits allowed for Part 15 unlicensed devices.

Through a solicitation broadcast on the station for advertisers and a vehicle parked outside the building, the FCC agents were able to determine that the telephone number in the announcement belonged to Tulloch, and the car was registered in his name. FCC agents made several visits to Paterson in late 2015 and early 2016. In October of 2016, agents returned to Paterson and determined that the signal source had relocated to another nearby multi-family structure. A *Notice of Unlicensed Operation (NOUO)* was posted on the door of the building and the following month, the FCC mailed an *NOUO* to Tulloch.

Subsequent visits revealed that the station was still in operation, and, at some point, had moved back to its prior location. Additional *NOUOs* were issued. Finally, on September 15, 2017, two agents returned to Paterson and determined that the station no longer was on the air.

In the *Forfeiture Order*, the FCC incorporated by reference the details of the investigation spelled out in the earlier *NAL*.

The Tulloch case is among dozens that the FCC Enforcement Bureau has initiated in the past couple of years in efforts to shut down pirate broadcasters across the US, the vast majority of which are *not* FCC amateur licensees.

Detained Norwegian HAM Now Allowed to Leave Chad

A tense situation involving a Norwegian radio amateur that reached the diplomatic and foreign ministry level in the African Republic of Chad now has been resolved. Kenneth Opskar, LA7GIA, had only operated as TT8KO for about a day before security police shut down his station on October 10. At that point, he'd logged and uploaded 2,150 contacts and had installed all antennas except a 160-meter vertical. Opskar considered the incident a minor distraction, until he was told that he had to remain in Chad pending undetermined scrutiny of his station and activity. Now, after having been detained in Chad for more than a week, Opskar said on October 24 that he's free to go.

"I received the news that I can leave Chad immediately," Opskar told *DX-World*, which has been posting updates on a running basis. His solo DXpedition is over, however.

"I am not allowed to transmit. All antennas are to be taken down today before sunset, because there is a presidential event at the hotel tomorrow, and he will be here," Opskar said. "Hotel is now packed with VIPs, police, and military personnel. I am done with sightseeing, so my flight is booked for tomorrow."

Initially, Opskar had remained optimistic that all would be well after the security police chief's personal inspection of his equipment. Things got more stressful on October 13, however, after he underwent two interrogations by the security police. "My gear has been disconnected," he said at the time. "The antennas on the roof are locked down, [and] I cannot access them even for visual inspection or maintenance. I am not allowed to touch anything."

On October 14, Opskar reported that the security police had deemed all of his documents to be in order. "However, what now causes the delay is the fact that ARCEP [Chad's telecommunications regulator], which issued all documents, did not inform the security police. The police do not issue authorizations, but supervise the national security. The police are now after ARCEP, not me. Still, even after lots of meetings...they can't say when they will inform me." Opskar made plans to leave Chad on October 18 but was not permitted to disassemble his equipment until an inspection was completed.

On October 18, however, Opskar reported that a police order had been issued preventing him from leaving Chad, even without his equipment. "The Norwegian embassy and foreign ministry [are] now working on the issue," he said at the time.

Opskar said the many encouraging emails every day from DXers around the world helped to keep up his spirit. He said the staff of the hotel where he's staying had been very supportive too.

Licensed since 1992, Opskar has operated either solo or with another radio amateur from Malawi, Comoros, Equatorial Guinea, Central African Republic, Democratic Republic of Congo, Somalia, and Chad.

Proposed Changes to the Tri-Town RAC Constitution and By-Laws dated January 1, 1996

The Board proposes the following changes. They were reviewed at the October meeting and passed. They will be reviewed a second time at the November business meeting and a vote taken. Changes will effective January 1, 2019. Please review the changes, prepare any comments and bring them with you to the November meeting. This worked well at the October meeting. There was only a few discussion points. The changes passed with no revisions.

Proposed changes are in ***Bold Italic***

CONSTITUTION CHANGES

Article III Class of Membership

Eliminate Associate Member

Life Member: Any person who holds Full Membership in the Club and makes application in writing to the Club, submits the appropriate fee, is approved by the Board of Directors and expresses a willingness to abide by this Constitution and By-Laws and such rules as shall from time to time be promulgated by this Club.

Life Member: Reserved to members who were granted Life Member status prior to January 1, 2019 or elected to the Tri-Town Hall of Fame.

Article IV Membership

New Membership: Each person desiring to be a member of the Club (except Honorary and Student Memberships) shall submit a written application and payment of the appropriate fee. If approved by the majority of the Board of Directors, this person shall become a member of the Club.

New Membership: Each person desiring to be a member of the Club (except Honorary, Student and ***Hall of Fame Memberships***) shall submit a written application and payment of the appropriate fee. If approved by the majority of the Board of Directors, this person shall become a member of the Club.

Article VI Committees

Eliminate Property Committee

Article VII Meetings

Regular Meetings: Shall be held on the third Fridays of each month of the year at a time and place designated by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall use every appropriate means to notify each member of a change in either the time or place of a regular meeting at least five (5) days prior to the meeting.

Regular Meetings: Shall be held each month of the year at a time and place designated by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall use every appropriate means to notify each member of a change in either the time or place of a regular meeting at least five (5) days prior to the meeting. Meeting to be defined as a business meeting or social event with allowance for inactive months.

Quorum: A quorum of any regular or special meeting shall consist of not less than fifteen (15) voting members of this Club. No meeting will be considered official unless at least either two (2) officers and one (1) non officer Board member or three (3) members of the Board of Directors are present.

Quorum: A quorum of any regular or special meeting shall consist of not less than ten (10) voting members of this Club. No meeting will be considered official unless at least either two (2) officers and one (1) non officer Board member or three (3) members of the Board of Directors are present.

Article IX Board of Directors

Eligibility: For election to the Board of Directors a member shall be limited to past officers of the Club for two (2) Director positions and to any voting member of the Club for the third position.

Eligibility: For election to the Board of Directors a member shall be limited to a past officer of the Club for one (1) Director position and any two (2) voting member of the Club for the other two (2) positions.

Article X Trustee

Trustee: There shall be one (1) Trustee to whom the Club station license is assigned. This Trustee is to be appointed by the President and his term is unlimited. The Trustee may be removed by a majority vote of the Board of Directors.

Trustee: There shall be one (1) Trustee to whom the Club station license is assigned. This Trustee is to be appointed by the President and his term is unlimited. The Trustee may be removed by a majority vote of the Board of Directors. **The Trustee is expected to serve the Board in an advisory role while executing this position.**

Item 5. (New Item)

5. Disposal Process of Club Property.

The Club Board of Directors (The Board) shall dispose of Club property in the following manner:

- A. The Board, or its appointed representative, will determine what property is to be sold, the selling price and when it will be available for purchase.***
- B. Property will be priced at fair market value based on age, operating condition and the results of recent sales of comparable property.***
- C. Notice of property sales will be made to the Club membership. An announcement must be made at least one Club meeting prior to the property being put up for sale. Examples of this notice may include: listing on the Club***

website, listing in the Club newsletter, or a special email notice, and direct mailing to members not receiving email communications from the Club.

- D. Club membership will be able to buy property at its published price, on a first come basis. The Board may opt to accept/reject any best offered price by a Club member after the item has been listed for thirty days.**
- E. After thirty days any property not acquired by the membership can be disposed of by any public method approved by the Board. This could include but is not limited to online auctions, hamfests and ham web sales. A full accounting of all property sold will be made to the membership at the next Club meeting and published in the Club newsletter.**

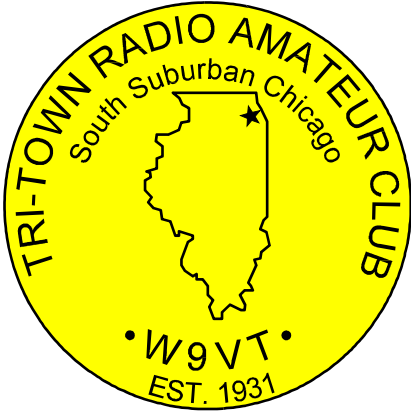
